The State Bar of Michigan Animal Law Section supports HB 4478, which would allow animals to be included in personal protection orders. Research studies show the strong connection between violence against humans and animal abuse and that victims of domestic violence will delay or avoid leaving an abusive situation for fear of what will happen to their animals. Abusers will often use animals to try to manipulate and control their victims. By the end of 2014, 29 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico had all enacted legislation to allow the inclusion of pets in PPOs. Michigan needs to join that growing list of states in order to provide greater protection for both humans and animals in Michigan.
