Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

This is part of a three bill package (HB 4731-4733) that would eliminate marriage licenses and civil marriage ceremonies, restrict marriage ceremonies to clergy, and rely on clergy issued marriage certificates and affidavits of common law marriage to establish a valid marriage. The Family Law Section opposes the elimination of marriage licenses and civil ceremonies. Marriage significantly changes the participants' rights and responsibilities toward one another, and the license and ceremony help signify those changes. The Family Law Section opposes these bills.
