## Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

This is part of a 3 bill package (HB 4731-4733) that would eliminate marriage licenses and civil ceremonies, substituting marriages certificates issued by religious practitioners and affidavits of common law marriage. HB 4732 allows only religious practitioners to conduct marriage ceremonies, The Family Law Section believes that civil ceremonies should remain a valid alternative for marriage, and that the ceremony reminds couples of the significant change in rights and responsibilities that marriage brings. The Family Law Section opposes this bill.
