<u>HB 4733</u> (Courser) Family law; marriage and divorce; government facilitated marriage licenses; eliminate, restore common law marriage, and only allow clergy to solemnize marriages. Amends title & secs. 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 & 8 of <u>1887</u> <u>PA 128</u> (MCL <u>551.101</u> et seq.); adds sec. 1a & repeals secs. 3a & 5 of 1887 PA 128 (MCL <u>551.103a</u> & <u>551.105</u>).

Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

This is part of a 3 bill package (HB 4731-4733) that would eliminate marriage licenses and civil ceremonies, substituting marriages certificates issued by religious practitioners and affidavits of common law marriage. HB 4733 eliminates the requirements of a license and ceremony, and substitutes an affidavit of marriage filed with the clerk as sufficient to establish a marriage. The Family Law Section believes that marriage brings a significant change in rights and responsibilities for a couple and that a license and ceremony help signify that change. The Family Law Section opposes this bill.
