<u>HB 4845</u> (Runestad) Family law; child custody; legal residence change of child whose parental custody is governed by court order; modify. Amends sec. 11 of <u>1970 PA 91</u> (MCL <u>722.31</u>).

Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

HB 4845 amends the statute requiring court permission to change the location of a child's legal residence by more than 100 miles and reduces it to 50 miles. It also changes the measurement of that distance to the amount measured by a vehicle's odometer. The Family Law Section opposes both amendments. Parties to custody cases should maintain some freedom to make decisions about where they wish to reside, and a 50 mile limit is overly restrictive. The measurement by a vehicle's odometer is not a consistent method of measurement, depending on the route taken. This will lead to disputes over appropriate driving routes (quickest versus shortest versus safest). The Family Law Section opposes this bill.
