Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

HB 6101 would amend the Freedom of Information Act to permit a public body to exempt from disclosure law enforcement investigating records that reveal specified identifying information in cases of child abuse, criminal sexual conduct, sexual assault or molestation against a minor. The committee supports the bill because it would protect minor victims' names or other identifying information from public disclosure. It would prohibit the victims' names from being released to the press or the general public. The bill would remove one barrier to minor victims who may be reluctant to cooperate with a criminal prosecution for fear that the case would because a matter of public record and reveal the minor's identity.
