Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

The State Bar opposed a similar Bill during a previous legislative session on the ground that this was a subject that should be left to the Supreme Court to regulate under its authority over practice and procedure in the courts. The Committee supports that view. On the merits of the bill, the Committee opposes the bill. Note-taking by jurors and pre-argument instructions may be appropriate in some cases, but they should be optional with the trial judge rather than mandatory. As a matter of courtesy, the judge may well want to tell the jurors how long a recess is expected to be, but such a requirement should not be enacted into a statute.
