Virtual Sustainability for Cities

To the Editor:

I recently read "Can a Virtual City Fix a Real Problem?" by Donald L. Knapp Jr. in the July 2013 issue of the *Michigan Bar* *Journal.* Having worked and consulted on sustainability issues, I have counseled on the use of intergovernmental agreements where local jurisdictions may have a desire to pursue sustainable initiatives in their areas but have neither the financial resources nor internal expertise in the area to do so.

To defray costs, similarly situated communities—as was the case between Livonia and Grand Rapids—can combine resources to pursue common sustainability goals. In fact, the Municipal Services Authority design may be the vehicle by which these sustainability services can be implemented.

The Green Bay Smart Growth 2022 Plan references the use of intergovernmental agreements for achieving the aims of smart growth, which especially depends on regional cooperation because it involves efficient public investments, constraints on outward growth, environmental protection and conservation, farmland protection, and central area reinvestment. Even the U.S. Department of State in its media note dated June 3, 2013, supports cooperation between the Americas on climate change and energy issues.

Perhaps a subsequent article in the *Bar Journal* will be titled "Virtual Sustainability for Sustainable Cities."
