Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

HB 4883 amends the Paternity Act's confinement expense provision to require every paternity order to have a provision abating the collection of confinement expenses against a father during the time he has custody of the child. This would allow the custodial father to devote more family resources to the child. The Family Law Section felt that the goal of the bill was generally laudable, but we were concerned that restarting collection of confinement expenses would be much more difficult than stopping it, making it susceptible to collusive behavior. The Family Law Section opposes the bill as written, but would like to work with the sponsors on alternative language.
