**Position:** Oppose And Amend

#### Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

SB 694 allows the court to take jurisdiction over a family even if there is no unfit condition in the home, if the court anticipates that there will be unfit conditions in the future. Such possible unfit circumstances include allegations against a parent who is absent or has no contact with the juvenile, or the criminality of some other adult, even if the adult is not convicted of any crime. The bill undermines custody awards by allowing the juvenile court to remove children from families at will.

The Family Law Section opposes this bill.
