Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

HB 4659 creates a "Responsible Father Registry". A man who wishes to be notified of proceedings for adoption or termination of parental rights of a child he might have gathered must register with the registry. Except for men already established as the child's father through a paternity action or acknowledgment of parentage, failure to register waives the man's right to notice and operates as a denial of his interest in custody of the child. This requires fathers who are interested in the placement of their children to step up early, rather than disrupting placements at the last moment. The Family Law Section supports this bill.
