<u>SB 1176</u> (Cherry) Family law; marriage and divorce; persons authorized to solemnize marriage; provide prohibition if ordained via mail or internet or other electronic means. Amends sec. 7 of 1846 RS 83 (MCL <u>551.7</u>).

Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

SB 1176 would amend the definition of persons who are authorized to solemnize a marriage so that a "minister of the gospel or cleric or religious practitioner" does not include those who were ordained by mail or by the internet or other electronic means. A religious practitioner who took four years of mail order courses would not be authorized, but anyone ordained during a half-hour seminar at a local hotel would be OK. It is not appropriate (and of dubious constitutionality) for the legislature to determine valid religions, especially for the purpose of solemnizing marriages, where it would appear that the couple is the best judge of the process. The Family Law Section opposes this bill.
