<u>HB 5995</u> (Sheltrown) Criminal procedure; expunction; destruction of fingerprint records and arrest card for juveniles who successfully complete probation; allow. Amends sec. 3 of <u>1925 PA 289</u> (MCL <u>28.243</u>).

Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

The CII supports the proposed HB 5995 that would allow for the destruction of fingerprint records and arrest card for juveniles who successfully complete probation, with the provision that the language of the bill should contain clarification that it applies to outright dismissal of a case, and not to other dispositions the court may impose that are not a dismissal of the case but merely from the court's jurisdiction and oversight. An example of such a disposition would be a "warn and dismiss," where the court declines to take further action but it is still an adjudication of delinquency.



Support for this rule is consistent with the Committee on Justice Initiatives' priority during the coming year of addressing problems that face the criminal justice system.
