The work of justice in Michigan took a big step forward January 26. The report and recommendations of the Judicial Crossroads Task Force—a diverse group of leaders from the bench, bar, and the wider justice community was unveiled at a press conference at the State

Bar of Michigan in Lansing. Over the course of 18 months, the group examined our court structure and resources, business impact, access to justice, and technology. Broadly, the report and recommendations call for streamlining and modernizing our courts and fostering

Revealing the History of Michigan's County Courthouses


History lovers descended on the Michigan Supreme Court Learning Center on January 21 to take in a temporary exhibit highlighting Michigan's county courthouses.
