aw Day Activities in Michigan have promoted a better understanding of our laws and judicial system for many years. Thousands of students throughout Michigan have participated in the annual Law Day Essay Contest. The students who win the Essay Contest have an incredible experience reading their winning essays at the Law Day luncheon in Lansing. The luncheon is attended by attorneys, judges, legislators, teachers, principals, student winners, and Michigan Lawyer's Auxiliary members.

These Michigan Law Day activities have received awards from the American Bar Association and the American Lawyers Association in recent years. The State Bar of Michigan and MLA members have been working together to expand the reach of Law Day activities. This year, 3,000 letters were sent to every school in the state encouraging teachers and students to enter. The Law Day web pages (part of the SBM website, www. michbar.org) have been visited by more than 1,200 people since January 2002, alone.

The celebration of Law Day and the continuance of the Law Day Essay Contest fits the State Bar's Statement of Purpose. Law Day activities improve relations between the legal profession and the public, and promote the interests of the legal profession in the state. Law Day helps lawyers serve the public and helps them gain respect for lawyers. It is a way to get information about the law to the public. The Law Day program of the Law-Related Education committee contributes to achieving the current State Bar priorities. The mandate of the MLA is to improve citizen awareness of the law, to serve the organized bar associations of the state of Michigan and to support and assist local lawyers spouses' organizations.
