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HB 5466 – HB 5471

[HB 5471](#) (Outman) Family law; child support; consolidation of child support functions into 1 local agency; provide for in the status of minors and child support act. Amends sec. 3 of [1968 PA 293](#) (MCL [722.3](#)).

Support with recommended amendments

Explanation of the position, including any recommended amendments:

HBs 5466-5471 allow the Prosecuting Attorney and DHS to agree to transfer the PA's responsibilities to the Friend of the Court (with the Chief Judge's approval) or to an attorney under contract with the County or with DHS. Each bill clarifies that the attorney conducts proceedings on behalf of the state, and not as an attorney for a party. HB 5466 covers the Paternity Act, 5467 covers Revocation of Paternity Act, 5468 covers the Family Support Act, 5469 covers UIFSA, 5470 covers RURESA, and 5471 covers MCL 722.3.

There are at least eight circuits (including Wayne and Monroe) where the FOC already performs these functions, usually by having a "Deputy Prosecuting Attorney" employed by the FOC. These bills would legitimize that practice, and allow other counties to follow suit.

The Family Law Section supports these bills only if certain amendments are included. Only activities that are consistent with impartial decision making should be placed within a court agency such as FOC. There may be additional purely ministerial duties that could be placed within FOC, but one agency should not act as both the moving party and the adjudicator of the motion. These bills should be amended to assure that there remains a separation of functions when the PA's duties are transferred to the FOC, and that the duties must be performed under the supervision of an attorney.
