#### **Position:**

HB 4161, sponsored by Reps. Pastor and Gosselin and referred to Judiciary, would repeal part of the Acknowledgement of Paternity act (MCL 722.1006) which provides: "After a mother and father sign an acknowledgment of parentage, the mother is presumed to have custody of the minor child unless otherwise determined by the court or otherwise agreed by the parties in writing."

This provision is not a legal presumption in favor of the mother in the event of a custody dispute, but it prevents physical fights over possession of babies after the parents sign an acknowledgement of paternity (at the hospital, for example). If this provision is repealed, a newborn would be up for grabs as soon as a paternity acknowledgement was signed by both parties. It may be true that good fathers would never just grab their child and run, but this bill would allow bad fathers to do so. The council does not oppose a modification of the current statute to clarify that there is no legal presumption in favor of the mother in a custody dispute, but the council voted to oppose this bill.
