### Keller-permissible explanation:

The State Bar has previously supported legislation that assists convicted persons in obtaining identification as important for accessing legal services. Upon release from prisons, individuals without proper identification may not be able to access legal proceedings and administrative hearings held in state or federal buildings that require identification for entry.
